COVID-19

All areas in Aotearoa, outside of Auckland, are at Alert Level 2. Thank you all for your continuing mahi during this response. A few updates follow:

COVID-19 Testing

Anyone with COVID-19 symptoms, or who have been at a location of interest at the relevant time, or who have been identified as a contact by the contact tracing team should receive a COVID-19 test.

COVID-19 tests are free and available to everyone. NHI numbers are used to report on the test and track who is getting tested, and having this handy can speed up the testing process when people present for a swab. NHI numbers can be found on hospital letters, prescriptions or prescription receipts or copy of a past test result. The Ministry of Health has also established a new, free-call number to find out 0800 855 066. People do not need an NHI to receive a test, and people without NHIs will be assigned one. For up-to-date information on all testing locations, please visit the Healthpoint website.

We have been informed that people have been charged for testing for work reasons. Testing for COVID-19 is free, including for work, except for travel overseas.

COVID-19 Vaccination Bookings

Vaccination sites are still up and running. Wednesday 1 September, everyone in New Zealand who is 12 years and over are eligible to get a vaccination. This includes everyone, no matter what their immigration status. People can book their vaccines online at Book My Vaccine www.bookmyvaccine.nz - or by calling the COVID Vaccination Healthline on 0800 28 29 26 from 8am-8pm seven days a week. People do not have to wait for an invitation to book once they are eligible. Interpreters are available for people who ask. Please remember whaanau Maaori and Pacific families can be vaccinated together when one member of the family is eligible to be vaccinated.

Pacific people can also book vaccinations through K'aute Pasifika Trust by calling or texting 022 318 7151 or emailing Robert.lavei@kautepasifika.co.nz.

Reminder: Please do not get vaccinated when unwell

If you are unwell on the day of your COVID-19 vaccine appointment, you will need to reschedule to another date once you're better. The Book My Vaccine website is the fastest and easiest way to book and make changes to your appointment. Booking through the website can take 5 minutes or less. You can also email the Book My Vaccine team if you have any problems booking or need to change your details by emailing: booking@vaccine.covid19.health.nz

Needle Exchange Programme

Needle exchange programmes are important harm reduction interventions. Needle exchanges provide for the safe disposal of used needles and syringes.

The New Zealand Needle Exchange Programme is a nationwide programme funded by the Ministry of Health. They are a peer-based organisation, and committed to a health- and human rights-based service approach for people who inject drugs.

People who are injecting drugs can access needles, syringes and other equipment to support safe injecting practice and reduce risk of health related complications.

There are 21 Needle Exchanges across Aotearoa New Zealand, including 1 mobile exchange. In the Waikato, the Hamilton Needle Exchange Programme is located on 16 Vialou Street, Hamilton. 2021 Asian Mental Health and Wellbeing Snapshot


Asian Family Services have released this year's Asian Mental Health and Wellbeing Snapshot. It sheds excellent insights into the status of Asian health 18 months since COVID-19 lockdowns began.

- 47.9% of surveyed Asian people said they could not access language and/or cultural support regularly when they use health services in New Zealand. This phenomena was more pronounced for women.
- Survey participants living in Hamilton had higher rates of concerns due to COVID-19.
- Participants from Hamilton were more likely to worry about a recession, racial discrimination, increased mental stress, feeling isolated, and restricted access to food supplies.

Respiratory Virus Update

We have seen high rates of Respiratory Syncytial RSV cases continue to decline, in line with the usual incidence at this time last year. Seasonal Influenza is a major risk and is likely to return next winter. Although in the past Influenza has circulated into September and October, we haven't had a winter flu season actually start as late as this. If cases are introduced to the Waikato, they are unlikely to result in sustained transmission at this time of year.
